#### June 10, 2023

It was an overcast Saturday, with just a few sprinkles as Maggie and Goldie started down the parade route. They were following the banner announcing that National American Cream Draft Horse Day was coming on July 11th. I walked along the parade route talking with Cathy Jensen, who grew up about 2 miles from the parade route. She told me her father had last been in the Jewell parade with his team of American Creams nearly fifty years ago. She stopped along the way to talk with familiar residents, a county supervisor, and the curator of the local museum, where Barbara Knox Homrighaus later would speak on Erick Christian, an early 1900's veterinarian who played an important role in the early days of the cream horses. Maggie and Goldie were greeted warmly by the folks along the parade route. Maggie said the most difficult part was keeping Goldie out of the bag of candy Barb's sister and niece had to throw out while they carried the American Cream Day banner in front of Goldie. Clair Rierson was there to support us, and Renee Lupkes was there with her camera.


In the afternoon, we and a number of Jewell residents gathered at the Jewell History Museum to listen to Barbara Knox Homrighaus speak about the early history of what was to become the American Cream Draft Horse. It was a very well-researched exploration of Dr. Erick Christian, who may or may not have been educated as a veterinarian, but declared himself one and practiced the profession most of his life. She detailed how he and Harry "Hat" Lakin had bred Old Granny to various draft stallions, used the cream-colored


offspring to develop and improve these unique horses. After several successful breedings, one of the offspring was acquired by Charles Knox, her grandfather. His stallion was called Big Buck on the Knox farm, but was later called Knox 1st in the early registry.

We look forward to more detailed information on the early cream breeders from Barbara on July 8th, and at the National American Cream Day event July 11th, which will be at the Ellsworth Equine Area, to be renamed for C.T. Rierson.


